

The students had no idea where they were headed (although their parents were in on the secret). The buses shuttled the students to the Ohio



Fourth Grader is Fol Being a Leader, Sprin

Cooper Blair - Fo



In August, fourth grader Cooper Blair and his mother Richelle were passing time on a long flight to Mississippi by talking about a variety of topics - one of them will remain vivid in Richelle's mind for the rest of her life.

The two talked about being granted three wishes. She proudly smiled when Cooper said he wished everyone would be healthy. She chuckled when he said he wished he'd have an endless supply of toys, but what was next on his list took her breath away....

"One thing I will never wish for is to have real feet," he said.

"I was in shock," Richelle said. "Zach (his father) and I pray all the time that he's okay with this. Tears immediately filled my eyes. Did I just hear that? He amazes me every day."

You see the Blairs were traveling to Mississippi that day for Cooper to be fitted for a new pair of prosthetic legs. These weren't like his other prosthetics. This pair – Cheetahs - would have running blades on them, allowing him to sprint and lead him on a great adventure.

Cooper was born with a rare birth defect that cut off the circulation in his feet. He underwent 27 sets of casts and seven surgeries in an attempt to straighten his feet. When Cooper was two they met with an orthopedic surgeon at Johns Hopkins.

"He said we had two options, let him go on the way he is, but he'd never be able to walk with those feet; or amputate from the knee down and get prosthetics," she said. The Blairs immediately thought there is no way we can let them amputate our baby's feet. "There had to be an easier way."

In September of 2005, when Cooper was 26 months old, the Blairs agreed to what seemed like the most drastic measure, but after much prayer and reflection knew it was the right step in the direction of hope. After the surgery Cooper was fitted for his first

set of prosthetic walking legs. He would have these fittings every nine to 12 months during his growth years.

God winked at the Blairs again, when on

Christmas day, just three months after the surgery, Cooper took his first steps with his prosthetics. Since then he has truly taken off. He first wanted to play ice hockey. Zach and Richelle knew it would be difficult, but knew their son was a very determined boy. He learned to skate on his prosthetic legs like a lil' champ, however because the prosthetics did not have ankles that bend, it was hard to get up when he fell.

The work of guardian angels stepped in then. The "angels", better known as the Wheeling Nailers, put a nail at the top of Coopers hockey stick so when he'd fall down, he could use his stick as an ice pick to get right back up. Following hockey came baseball, flag football, basketball and even golf!

"He constantly amazes me," Richelle said. "Eight years ago we were overwhelmed with worry about what we foolishly thought our son wouldn't be able to do."

But the greatest lesson Zach and Richelle ever learned was from their son, "life has no limitations, except the ones you set for yourself."

"He doesn't see himself as being different," Richelle said. "He's perfectly happy with who he is. What more can you want as a parent?"

You can imagine if Cooper Blair had to write an essay about

"What did I do over summer vacation," he would be at no loss for words.

"I went to Oklahoma and won four gold medals for racing the 20, 60, 100, and 200 meter races," he said casually. Before Cooper went to Mississippi in August to get his special Cheetah prosthetics, he traveled to Oklahoma to the US Olympic training site in June. He arrived there two weeks before the Endeavor Games so he could train on his running blades. These blades helped him set national records for the 60 and 100 meter events. The Endeavor Games - a nationally recognized competition that allows all athletes with physical disabilities to participate in multi-sport events - is endorsed by U.S. Paralympics.

It was in Oklahoma Cooper met his role model, Schaquille Vance, a US Paralympics Gold Medalist. He introduced the Cheetah sprinting blades to Cooper.

"They are so cool," Cooper said. "They help you bounce forward instead of up like other running blades. In August I actually got to design mine and I picked to have WV on them and on the sides I had them put the Mountaineer man so that when I run by people they'll see the Mountaineer!"

Cooper said God made him this way for a reason and he accepts it.

"I could be frustrated, but why?" he said. "My mom, dad and sister (Camryn, OLP sixth grader) support me and keep me motivated. They are doing everything they can for me so I can reach my goals. They are my official trainers," he said with a laugh.

His favorite bible verse: Philippians 4:13 – I can do all things through Christ who strengthens me. "Even though I do not have

feet, I can do anything anybody else can do. I can do this because God and Jesus help me get through it," he said.

Stay tuned, Cooper's next goal is to go to the Endeavor Games' Nationals in Minneapolis and then on to the World Endeavor Games in Italy, competing in track and a triathlon. After that he aims to become a Paralympics athlete at 15 years old (the youngest age you can qualify).



Brother's experience motivates fundraising plan

Moved by her brother's determination OLP sixth grader, Camryn Blair, aims to raise funds for the Challenged Athletes Foundation.

"I got to go see Cooper compete in the Endeavor Games and met so many amazing (athletes)," Camryn said. "It costs a lot of money to travel there. I hope to help other athletes and their families get the chance to do what Cooper did."

Before the Blairs left for the Endeavor Games hundreds of people came out to cheer him on at John Marshall High School Stadium and Track.


Camryn wants to rejuvenate that same excitement and get her school and community to donate to his worthy cause.

"I don't know how much money we could raise, but it will definitely make a difference," she said.


Along with her parents and grandparents, Camryn is

Camryn's efforts are second nature to the culture of Our Lady of Peace School, as the school fosters a true community of service and proudly takes on Regina Service Learning initiatives.






Academic Excellence Continues for Filben:

He is a senior at John Marshall High School and is the only recipient of this exceptional honor in Marshall County this year. Each year 1.5 million students enter this elite scholarship program. Only 16,000 are named semifinalists. We all wish Tanner all the best and good luck in March when they announced the winners. He is a great role model for our students. The National Merit Scholarship Program is an academic competition



for recognition and scholarships. High school students enter the National Merit Program by taking the Preliminary SAT/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (PSAT/NMSQT)—a test which serves as an initial screen of approximately 1.5 million entrants each year—and by meeting published program entry/participation requirements.



Dunlevy is Leaving his Mark - Loud and Clear:

Trey Dunlevy, Class of 2010, represented West Virginia at the National Youth Leadership Forum on National Security in Washington, D.C. this fall. The NYLF on National Security is a leadership and career exploration program. This experience is loaded with opportunities for motivated students to develop critical success skills and explore career passions outside of the traditional classroom environment. Trey, a WPHS senior, was able to get a first-hand look at fields in national security, diplomacy, intelligence and defense.
